



Create your own adventure through time...

Rainbows origins can be traced back to 1960s
Northern Ireland. A group called "Bunnies" was run for girls aged 4 to 7 because they were too young for Brownies.

Bunnies did not have a Promise. Girls had to memorise their name and address.

Following adoption by the Trefoil Guild in Ulster, a programme of badges was introduced in 1980.

In 1985 Bunnies became officially recognised by Girlguiding in the UK and decision was made to launch Rainbows in 1987.



Carrot hunt

Hide carrots, or pictures of carrots, around your meeting place for an egg-hunt style search.

Leapfrog

At least two players are required but as many can play as you have room for!

Start with one player crouched on the floor tucking in their head down and their legs and feet in. The second player runs up to them from behind, placing their hands on their back and leaps over with their legs straddled wide apart on each side.

Once landed, the second player assumed the crouch position and the roles are reversed.

Add more players to increase the line and the number of leaps.

Sack race

Vegetable patch raid

Can you grab something from the vegetable patch without getting caught?

Place a selection of toy food, balls, or bean bags into a small area at one end of your meeting space. Choose some gardeners to protect the vegetable patch. They can only move side-to-side across the middle of space. Everyone else is a rabbit and must start from and return to the opposite end of the space.

When the leader calls out "go!" the rabbits have 1 minute to grab 1 vegetable each at a time from the patch and bring it back. If a gardener catches them, they must put the vegetable back in the patch and return to the start empty handed to have another go.

Back to the warren

Place several large hula hoops on the floor, representing rabbit holes. Choose someone to be a fox and everyone else to be rabbits. The fox must stand at the side facing away so that they cannot see.

The rabbits move around the space staying away from the hoops. The leader calls out "back to the warren!" The rabbits have 10 seconds to stand within a hoop before the leader calls out "fox!" Rabbits need to squeeze in together to be safe from the fox.

The fox now has 10 seconds to find any rabbits who have one or both feet outside of a hoop and tap them to capture them. They will become foxes too. Reduce the rabbits' head start by 2 seconds (until it is removed completely) and repeat the game until all the rabbits have been captured.

Create a real Rainbow

A rainbow appears in the sky when sunlight shines from behind you through rainwater droplets in front of you. The sunlight is split into different colours and takes the form a circular arc.

Use a CD, a DVD, a prism, a glass of water, or fine mist spray, with sunlight or a bright white light to create a Rainbow. A fine mist spray in bright sun will create a Rainbow in mid-air. For other methods reflect the rainbow onto a white or light-coloured surface.

Grow a rainbow

Grow a rainbow up a paper towel. Along the bottom edge of the paper towel, add different coloured ink, food colouring, or colour in adjacent squares with pens. Place this bottom edge into water and watch as your rainbow grows up the paper towel.

Rainbow on a plate

When you place Skittles sweets in water the food colouring and sugar coating dissolves and spreads. It makes a cool rainbow effect.

Arrange different coloured Skittles around the outside of a plate. Next add a little warm water and watch their rainbow tails grow.





A light study


Light is made up of all the colours of the rainbow. This is called the light spectrum. Every natural element has a characteristic light spectrum, like a finger-print in the light.

Make a working spectrometer using a CD and a cereal box. Cut a slot into the side of the box, at a 30° angle, to slide in the CD shiny side up. Cut out a square on the top of the box, above the CD, to look through. Next cut a very neat slit on the opposite end of the box for the light to go in. The cleaner this is cut the better.

Use your spectrometer with difference sources of light, and types of light bulb, to see the different rainbows on the CD.







create a stack of colours in a glass.

Mixing sugar into water increases its weight. By adding different amounts of sugar to each colour and carefully adding each colour to one glass, you can make a stack. Don't forget to start with the heaviest colour (most sugar) and finish with the lightest.

Rainbow craft

Paint, draw or make a rainbow using craft materials.

There are lots of ideas, including creating a rainbow paperchain, tassels, or a popup card!






